Hello again,

LEARNING THOUGH NATURE celebrated its third birthday in April. Grateful thanks to so many people and institutions for your continued encouragement and support and making use of the services we offer.

Since our last newsletter **LEARNING THROUGH NATURE** continued with various projects from 2011 and stared some new ones. There have been many opportunities for personal learning and growth as you will find out as you read through this newsletter.

The work with **UNISA** has increased to include:

1. E-tutoring After attending a tutor workshop in Johannesburg in February to meet fellow tutors, lecturers and inspirational guest speakers as well as visiting the relevant department at UNISA the work of e-tutoring began. For this we dealt with one module, Animal Studies, for first years and were in touch with students around the country by e-mailing weekly tutorial letters, highlighting certain sections within the chapters, suggested additional reading, tips on e.g. how to draw and label diagrams, etc. Conversations would develop through e-mail and on the UNISA website and it was good to establish a rapport with the students getting the feeling that what you were doing was helping and making a difference for them

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2. Face-to-face tutoring with first year Nature Conservation and Horticultural students located in and around Pietermaritzbura. The vear-long courses have now become semester courses although there still seems to be the same amount of work that needs to be covered in Animal Studies, Plant Studies and Fundamentals of Conservation (previously known as Conservation Development) Readers of this newsletter will remember that we were rewriting this module along with Maartin Strauss from UNISA. This is the first semester that we are proudly using the new learning material.

3. Writing of a Basic Environmental Education (CIN2601) module for second year students which is about to be published and used in 2013.

4. **Marking** of assignments and exam scripts for Fundamentals of Conservation is on-going.

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LIMA RURAL DEVELOPMENT FOUNDATION The work of accrediting LIMA as a learning provider with Services SETA is on-going. There have been many frustrations and delays in the course of trying to gain the next step in the compliance process but we are ever hopeful that there will be an end in sight.

Work with **WESSA – SustainEd** in the form of assessment of Portfolios of Evidence is ongoing. This included the assessment of the Eco-Schools, KZN Wildlife and Stepping Up Environmental Educators course groups as well as practical assessment of Site Guides in Durban. Coming up is the assessment of the first module of the Environmental Education, Training and Development Practices (EETDP) and the Environmental Practices courses for the 2012 intake of candidates and second assessment of the EETDP course which was run in Cape Town.

A new and exciting challenge offered was to **co-facilitate two assessor courses** with Debbie Perry in Johannesburg (March) and Durban (May). The candidates are keen to learn and asked many questions. The courses were sponsored by the Local Government SETA (LG SETA) in association with WESSA.
